Dear Community Partners and Municipal Neighbours,

As you are all aware, the United Townships of Head, Clara & Maria is a small municipality with limited services. In most regards, we manage to get along just fine with the services we are able to provide to our citizens. There is however one large gap in services that remains a great concern to Council, and that is the absence of any auto-extrication services in our municipality.

This municipality runs along over 60 kilometers of Highway 17, through the hamlets of Deux Rivieres, Bissett Creek, Stonecliffe and Mackey. There are many travellers who pass thorough our municipality each day without the knowledge that we do not have any services available to them in the event of an automobile accident where they become trapped in their vehicle.

Up until August 2015 there were arrangements in place with neighbouring municipalities to provide auto-extrication services in the event of an accident in Head, Clara & Maria. Since that time, the threat to our residents has remained a concern. This gap in service is a danger for all of our residents; those who are permanent, seasonal and also those who become a temporary resident during their drive over the portion of Highway 17 that spans through our municipality.

We understand there are many factors involved in making a decision to share services such as auto-extrication with the United Townships of Head, Clara & Maria, however; our current Council would like to once again approach our neighbouring municipalities and community partners to discuss any options that may be available to help us fill this void.

We would like to thank you for taking the time to consider this request. At this time, we are only requesting that a dialogue be initiated to begin to discussing possibilities. We plan to schedule a meeting in early fall to initiate discussions for those who are willing.

City Council Decision

- 6. City Council request the City Clerk to distribute City Council's decision to other municipalities in Ontario, the Ontario Municipal Social Services Association and the Association of Municipalities of Ontario.

Summary

The lack of affordable, high-quality early learning and child care is one of the most significant challenges for families in our City. The pandemic has exacerbated the situation, and

accentuated the importance of child care for Toronto parents.

We have seen the gendered-impact of the pandemic on women. We have experienced the toll on parents, particularly mothers, because of the lack of access to child care. We know women will continue to face huge barriers to equitable participation in our economy if child care is not at the centre of COVID-19 recovery strategies. We also know that underserved communities, low-income and BIPOC families, people with disabilities, and those who are precariously-employed will not share in the benefits of economic renewal without access to affordable child care.

A broad consensus has emerged across all sectors, including business, academic, social service and feminist organizations, that a robust system of accessible, high-quality child care services is essential for Canada's economic renewal. The time is now to make long-awaited progress on child care for Toronto families.

The Government of Canada has recognized that investment in child care is urgently needed, and of national importance, for families and the economy. As part of the Budget 2021, it has committed to build a Canada-wide Early Learning and Child Care system that is affordable, high-quality and accessible for all families. The plan calls for \$30 Billion over 5 years, with an ongoing annual expenditure of \$8.3 Billion. The goal is to reduce fees by 50 percent by 2022, and achieve an average cost of \$10.00 per day by 2026.

The announcement is welcome news for women, their families, and cities across the Country. Toronto manages the second largest system of child care services in the Country, and it is important for our City to show its support for building a strong system of Early Learning and Child Care in Toronto and across Ontario – and that we are ready to work with the Federal and Provincial governments to achieve it.

City Council must reinforce the urgency, and express our willingness to be partners with all levels of government, and to act now, with urgency, to ensure this promise becomes a reality for Toronto children and families.







It will not only tell us how many people are homeless within our district, but who they are and what services they require to leave homelessness.

In 2021, Nipissing counts will include a count and survey component, regarding the number of people experiencing:

- · Absolute homelessness in emergency shelters and domestic violence shelters
- Transitional housing
- Sleeping rough in unsheltered locations
- No fixed address staying in public systems (ie. hospitals, corrections, detox centres)
- Hidden homeless who are couch surfing with friends and/or family (survey only)

It is the projected goal that the data collected from this endeavor, will support the District of Nipissing to:

- Identify the demographics and needs of the local homeless population
- Enhance system planning and program development
- Measure progress towards ending homelessness in our district

The Municipal Council of the Town of Fort Erie at its meeting of May 31, 2021 passed the following resolution:

Whereas primary residences are currently exempt from a capital gains tax, and

Whereas currently secondary and additional non-primary properties are subject to capital gains, and

Whereas the Federal Government is currently looking into a primary residence capital gains tax as they have recognized that affordable housing has become a serious issue in Canada, and

Whereas smaller communities including the Town of Fort Erie are seeing unprecedented higher selling prices that are outpacing prices in larger cities, and

Whereas many hard-working Canadians who have only a primary residence with no additional non-primary homes count on their home equity as financial aid to apply to upsizing or downsizing their home depending on their personal situation, and

Whereas a change in taxation to primary residences would be a significant financial blow to Canadians and would create an unfair, two-tiered taxation which could lead to depleted savings, inter-generational disparities, disparities among diverse groups such as seniors who may have a significant portion of their savings vested in their primary residence, as well as, reducing the ability of home ownership thereby a further, higher need for rentals, and

Whereas the Federal government could look at other means to slow down the rapidly escalating housing costs to improve housing affordability;

Now therefore be it resolved,

That: The Federal Government cease further consideration of eliminating capital gains tax exemptions on primary residences, and further

That: A copy of this resolution be circulated to The Right Honourable Justin Trudeau, The Honourable Doug Ford, Premier of Ontario, All Members of Parliament, All Members of Provincial Parliament, The Regional Municipality of Niagara, and all Municipalities, for their support.

Update from Descon Construction

Mr. Demeis of Descon Construction provided the committee with an update on the

construction to date. Plumbing has been completed. Construction has begun at the front of the building as well.

Framing has been completed in the North, East and West wings of the building. This shows the size of the units and the layout.

Most of the products for the units have been solidified by the company. COVID-19 has brought its challenges but the team is working through everything to make sure the project keeps moving forward.

Exterior work will begin the first week in August with removal of the wood siding and replacing with metal siding. The current pavilion will be removed and yard cleared.

4.1 Appliance Selected for Units - Update

The list of appliances that were supplied to the committee were ordered by Descon Construction through another job. They were purchased in bulk at a discount rate. If the committee would like different appliances there is an increased cost and no guarantee that they will arrive in time due to COVID-19 set backs.

The committee approved the style of fridge and stove purchased for the units. The fridge is freezer on top and white in colour and the stove has the control knobs on top in back. The accessible units will have different stoves with the control knobs in front.

Mr. Demeis will look into the door alarm system that was sent to the committee for selection.

Architects will be providing the committee with a board of wall colours and flooring to chose from in the near future.

5. New Business

Members of the committee met with the Housing Committee from the Township of Bonfield for fundraising efforts. Both committees were interested in coordinating fundraising efforts to assist each committee. It was decided that our committee will not proceed at this time with fundraising and will bring up at a later date.

A rendering was provided to the committee in draft form and will have changes to the picture. The committee will have to make some decisions on naming the building.




- Removal and re-support of structural walls to make room for new layout is ongoing.

Member Mayors and Councils of the Cassellholme Board of Management for the District of Nipissing East copy to agencia

Dear Colleagues,

I am writing today to make some constructive suggestions on how we might collectively move forward to address the need for increased long-term care capacity in East Nipissing. It is fair to say we are at a place none of us expected to be when we began this process ten years ago, but I believe that presents us with a real opportunity to take control to get things right.

I am therefore suggesting that we unanimously call on the province to support our municipalities in requiring the Board of Management to redo a proper tendering process. As we know, the Ontario Construction Association cited serious concerns with the initial tender, which in turn limited the range of qualified respondents to a single company. We will never know if the price and terms being imposed on us are fair and reasonable if we have nothing to compare to and I believe we owe it to our taxpayers to try to get competitive bids from no less than three qualified contractors.

In addition to launching a new tendering process, I propose that we all consider the following five specific steps:

- 1. Immediately alter the membership of the Board of Management to include at least three skills-based members with experience in such areas as construction management and municipal finance. Even if these members are ex-officio, it is important that going forward the Board of Management have these important perspectives represented around their decisionmaking table in addition to that of our appointed political representatives.
- 2. Determine what reasonable per bed construction costs are for the redevelopment of a Long-Term Care facility. Aside from more than doubling the projected cost of this project since we began these discussions ten years ago, we have conflicting advice on how the sole bid that was received compares to other LTC projects currently underway in the province - some say we are completely in line while others believe the sole bid received could be as much as 50% higher than the norm.
- 3. The nine member municipalities deserve a straight answer on whether the type of guaranteed financing arrangement being imposed on us is necessary or if there are other options. It seems to me that this is an accounting model that works well in theory but has no regard for the realities of municipal budgets and the pressures our residents are already under.

- 4. We need to better understand the impact and necessity of member municipalities being forced to guarantee not only our own share of the construction costs but also the provincial portion of the project. It seems ironic that a facility that is funded by the provincial government would also require member municipalities to max out their borrowing capacity to secure a provincial construction loan to redevelop it. In the case of Papineau-Cameron, this could mean doubling tax bills in the coming years if costs of this redevelopment are not reigned in, and the full weight of the project is placed on our shoulders. We cannot through this single project tie our hands and restrict our ability to deliver all the other high-quality services and infrastructure that our residents deserve. I encourage everyone to examine what this means for their taxpayers and your ability to deliver other major initiatives that are priorities locally.
- 5. Commence discussions with the province on amending the Long-Term Care Homes Act to make the terms of belonging to and exiting a Board of Management fairer to member municipalities. Having everyone within a certain catchment area participating on a per capita basis may have seemed like a good idea when the model was created but what we are learning now is member municipalities are remarkably close to losing their autonomy and having serious long term financial handcuffs placed on them by an unelected body. I will always support a good deal if it makes sense for the people I represent but I will not stand by and accept the imposition of a deal that jeopardizes the delivery of vital municipal services for years to come.

I want to be clear — this letter to all of you and these recommendations are not meant to point fingers. It is a request to seize the opportunity that is before us to get the redevelopment of Cassellholme back on track on terms that we can all get behind. We all have a common goal to improve and expand patient care in East Nipissing. I ask for your support and look forward to a discussion soon about these suggestions and any other good ideas that member municipalities wish to bring forward.

As some of you may be aware, yesterday, the <u>Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program (ICIP)</u> opened it's application intake window for a second round of funding under the Green Infrastructure Stream.

This round of funding is targeted towards smaller municipalities, First Nations and Local Service Boards with populations under 100,000.

Eligible project categories include drinking water projects that:

- Focus on addressing critical health and safety issues or;
- Projects that relate to rehabilitation and replacement (i.e. no new builds or expansion of existing assets to accommodate growth/development).

The application intake window will close September 9, 2021.

We are providing this information as it may be useful to smaller systems with compliance issues that could be resolved through funding.

The Ministry of Infrastructure has recently provided letters to eligible applicants and is in the process of sending webinar invitations and promotional materials on the application process. 

- All drinking water samples required under O. Regulation 170/03 were collected and tested in the second quarter of 2021 and all results fell within regulatory limits.

- Quarterly trihalomethanes (THM), haloacetic acids (HAA), Nitrate and Nitrite sampling completed April 27, 2021.
- Off-site external S1-Surveillance audit completed June 15, 2021, there were no findings identified.
- No Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks (MECP) or Ministry of Labour (MOL) inspections conducted this quarter.
- Flow meter calibrations completed.
- All required sewage samples required under the system's ECA collected and tested in the second quarter of 2021.
- New flow meter installed at valve chamber at lagoon on August 21, 2020. The flow meter was struck by lightning again in November 2020, outputs were damaged (readings still available from flow meter). There were also upgrades to Blake (451 Bissett) SLS pump panel which allowed for calculated flows as backup flow recording. Temporary flow meter was installed at lagoon in mid-February 2021 (which was damaged and out of service in mid-March), and values were compared to Blake Station flows. They were constantly within 5 % of each other, showing that the Blake Station calculations are accurate. February 24, 2021 the damaged flow meter was sent out for repair, while recording accurate flows from Blake Station. April 7, soft starts for pump panel were damaged during new transfer switch install, which resulted in loss of flow recording from the Blake Station. Therefore, since April 7, 2021 @ 1430 there have been no flow recording devices functional. While, flow meter and backup device out of service, alternate method of calculating daily raw flows will be used. Daily pump hours and average pump rate will be used to calculate approximate flows. The original lagoon flow meter has been repaired by the manufacturer and is being shipped back. The pump panel at Blake Station will be repaired upon receipt of parts. Repaired flow meter installed and functional on April 9, 2021. MECP notified of incident of non-compliance.


MATTAWA DRINKING WATER SYSTEM PERFORMANCE

Main Street Recovery Act: Proclamation of Amendments to the Municipal Act and City of Toronto Act

Dear Chief Administrative Officers and Clerks:

As you may know, in fall 2020, the government introduced amendments to the Municipal Act, 2001 and City of Toronto Act, 2006 through Bill 215, Main Street Recovery Act, 2020. I am writing to update you that these legislative changes are scheduled to come into force on September 19, 2021.

As we collectively work to recover from the impacts of the pandemic, these legislative changes will help support economic recovery on main streets across Ontario and help ensure that important goods can continue to be delivered to businesses in our communities as efficiently as possible. Past pilot projects, which worked with municipal partners, have shown that the changes could also help reduce rush-hour traffic, lower fuel costs for businesses, and reduce greenhouse gas and other emissions.

From September 19, 2021 onwards, municipalities will not be able to regulate noise related to the delivery of goods to the following destinations:

- Retail business establishments;
- 2. Restaurants, including cafes and bars;
- Hotels and motels; and
- Goods distribution facilities.

These changes will come into force on the same day as the expiry of temporary regulations (O. Reg. 70/20 and O. Reg. 71/20). These regulations, introduced at the outset of the pandemic, limit municipalities from regulating all noise related to the delivery of goods. From September 19, 2021 onwards, once the temporary regulations expire, municipalities will again have the authority to regulate delivery noise to destinations other than the four categories listed above.

Many municipalities, as well as business and logistics sector stakeholders, have expressed support for providing more flexibility for deliveries because of the benefits they offer Ontario's main street businesses and the local communities these businesses serve. Local businesses also have an interest in working to ensure that they continue to be good neighbours while planning for deliveries of goods to their businesses.

Prior to these amendments coming into force and for clarity for your stakeholders, your municipality may wish to review any applicable bylaws and consider whether any changes are necessary to align with the new framework. If your municipality has any questions on these changes, I would encourage you to contact your local Municipal Services Office.

We will continue to monitor the implementation of this new framework. The Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing has regulation-making authority to authorize municipalities to regulate delivery noise to the businesses noted above. No regulations are proposed to be made at this time to minimize burden for municipalities and businesses but may be considered in the future if deemed necessary.

Thank you for your continued support and collaboration as we work to support economic recovery in Ontario's communities.

We have several announcements relating to the federal Gas Tax Fund:

2021's top-up funds have been released

We expect to be able to distribute 2021's top-up funds starting this week. Your community will receive \$121,527.87.

This amount is in addition to the \$126,416.60 that your community received earlier this year for 2021's scheduled allocation. An updated schedule of payments for your community is attached.

The Fund has been renamed

The federal Gas Tax Fund is now formally known as the Canada Community-Building Fund. AMO will update materials referencing the Fund over the coming months.

Fire stations are now eligible

Eligibility criteria remain unaffected - with one exception. Fire stations are now eligible for funding. AMO will update guidance documents shortly.

Updates to our reporting systems will take more time. We plan to launch a new reporting site in January 2022; your community will be able to report investments in fire stations once the new site is available. Please contact us if you expect to invest funds in fire stations in the meanwhile.
