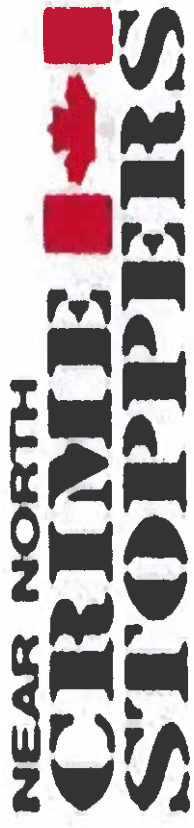

**Crime Stoppers is based on the simple principle that for every crime committed, someone, other than the criminal, has information that could solve a crime.**

# How does Crime Stoppers work?



Person calls in to the TIP line, or submits online information to the website, [nearthcrimestoppers.com](http://nearthcrimestoppers.com) on criminal activity;

Does not reveal name; no call display or tracing;

Gives detailed information to coordinator; then given an ID number. Asked to call back to receive an update on investigation;

Info forwarded to appropriate agency; agency reports back the results of investigation;

If TIP leads to successful conclusion of an investigation, the tipster will be eligible for a cash reward. Arrangements are made to pick up reward.

Tipster's identity never known, never has to testify

Whereas the Ontario Amber Alert is a warning system that quickly alerts the public of a suspected abduction of children who are in imminent danger;

And Whereas the goal is to broadcast as much information about the child, the abductor and suspect vehicles as quickly as possible so that the public can respond with any relevant information that might lead to the child's safe return;

And Whereas people are encouraged to share the Amber Alert with as many people as possible. If a child or vulnerable person is abducted, spreading the information quickly is critical to their safe return;

And Whereas an Amber Alert makes the Public aware to keep an eye out for the child, vulnerable person, suspect and the vehicle described, in the alert. If they spot them, try to gather as many details as they can, including the specific location where they saw them, the time, the direction they were travelling in and any other identifying details that will help to locate them;

And Whereas an Amber Alert gives citizens instructions to call 9-1-1 or the phone number included in the alert immediately if they have a trip or a sighting related to an Amber Alert;

An Amber Alert will only be activated if:

- The police have confirmed that an abduction has taken place; and
- There is reason to believe the victim is in danger of serious physical injury, and there is information available that, if broadcast to the public, could assist in the safe recovery of the victim.

And Whereas it is essential to remember that an Amber Alert is not always appropriate in every circumstance and that their continued effectiveness depends on ensuring that they are only used in cases that meet the above criteria;

And Whereas the recent tragic death of 11 year old Draven Graham showed that the Amber Alert system is flawed when it comes to vulnerable children who can go missing but are not abducted;

And Whereas at the time this motion was written, there have been almost 75,000 citizens who had signed a petition on Change.Org requesting that a Draven Alert be created;

And Whereas it is clear that there needs to be an addition to the alert system to allow for law enforcement to send out an alert for vulnerable children who go missing under circumstances that do not involve an abduction but are at serious risk of injury or death;

Therefore be it resolved that the Municipality of Brighton and its Council endorse the following:

1. That the Minister of the Solicitor General and the Commissioner of the Ontario Provincial Police, as well as the Premier's Office, be requested to make the necessary changes to the Amber Alert system and create a new alert called the Draven Alert, which will protect vulnerable children who have not been abducted but are at high risk of danger, injury or death and alert the public that they are missing.
2. That this motion be sent to all municipalities across Ontario and the Association of the Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) for endorsement.

Description: Annual Emergency Exercise Exemption

**RESOLUTION:**

WHEREAS Ontario Regulation 380/04: Standards under the Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act sets the municipal standards for emergency management programs in Ontario and requires municipalities to conduct an annual exercise with their Emergency Control Group in order to evaluate the municipality's emergency response plan and procedures, O. Reg. 380/04, s. 12(6);

AND WHEREAS Emergency Management Ontario previously granted municipalities exemption for the annual exercise requirement when the municipality experienced an actual emergency with documented proof of the municipality actively engaging their emergency management procedures and plan in response to the emergency;

AND WHEREAS on August 5, 2021 the Chief, Emergency Management Ontario (EMO) issued a memo to Community Emergency Management Coordinators stating that effective immediately, the Chief, EMO would no longer be issuing exemptions to the O. Reg. 380/04 requirements to conduct an annual exercise;

AND WHEREAS municipalities experience significant costs and burden to staff resources when faced with the response to an actual emergency and activation of their Emergency Control Group and/or Emergency Operations Centre;

AND WHEREAS a municipality's response to an actual emergency is more effective than an exercise in evaluating its emergency response plan and procedures as mandated by O. Reg. 380/04;

Dear Ms Desormeau

We are writing to you today to appeal for your support with respect to the PSW Training Program that we are hoping to launch here in Mattawa in partnership with the Near North District School Board (NNSDB) in September 2022

Recognizing the extreme shortage of PSWs, the NNSDB has spearheaded an innovative PSW living classroom program. It is a hands on program where students learn right in the long-term care home they are placed. The program is supported by the Ministry of Education and the Ministry of Health and it is being offered to students free of charge. The NNSDB did attempt to offer this program in Mattawa through a partnership at Algonquin Nursing Home with a February 2022 start date, however, the program was cancelled due to insufficient enrollment.


We have been working with the NNSDB to continue to promote this program in the hopes that we could generate enough interest for a September 2022 program start date. However, in my discussions with my contact last week, we continue to fall short. The NNSDB needs to have 15 students for the break-even point with the funding they have available for its delivery. There are currently only 12 students registered. Therefore, we are, once again at risk of having the program in Mattawa cancelled.

In my discussions with the school board, they indicated that the cost of the program is approximately \$3,000 per student. So we are currently looking at a funding gap of \$9,000 in order to have this opportunity available locally. The school board does want to see the program go ahead in Mattawa, but it is unable to operate it at a deficit

Today, I am asking for your support to help offset the program deficit so that the program can still be launched here in Mattawa. We have 12 of the 15 students necessary for program delivery and that is 12 individuals who want to learn right here at home. That is 12 individuals that would have opportunities for skilled employment at the end of the program. And, that is 12 more potential PSWs in Algonquin Nursing Home's short labour pool!

## Backgrounder

The Age Well at Home initiative is a new federal grants and contributions program. The funding supports projects that enable seniors to age in place by providing support under two streams:

- In-Home Support Pilot Projects; and
- Scaling Up for Seniors.

### **In-Home Support Pilot Projects stream**

Under the In-Home Support Pilot Projects stream, eligible organizations with experience delivering volunteer-based services to low-income and otherwise vulnerable seniors can receive funding to expand their services to more seniors or offer additional services, as well as help seniors navigate and access eligible services provided by other local organizations. Eligible services are

- light housekeeping (such as laundry, cleaning);
- meal delivery and/or preparation;
- home maintenance (such as repairs, yard work, lawn mowing);
- transportation (such as to appointments, errands);
- snow removal;
- volunteer drop-offs (such as groceries, medication, pet supplies), and
- friendly visiting in the home.

Eligible organizations for the In-Home Support Pilot Projects stream include:

- not-for-profit organizations;
- municipal governments;
- educational institutions;
- Indigenous entities (including band councils, tribal councils and self-government entities); and
- health and social services institutions.

Provincially/territorially funded public institutions are eligible to receive funding, with the agreement of the provincial/territorial government.

Projects must take place within a local area (not on a national or provincial/territorial scale) and end by March 31, 2025, with funding between \$300,000 and \$800,000 available per project.

### **Scaling Up for Seniors stream**

Under the Scaling Up for Seniors stream, organizations can receive funding to expand services that have already demonstrated results in helping seniors age in place. Applications must include the delivery of services in more than one province or territory. Indigenous governments and organizations located in Quebec can choose whether to propose to scale up within a single province or territory.

Eligible organizations for the Scaling Up for Seniors stream include:

- not-for-profit organizations;
- municipal governments;
- educational institutions;
- Indigenous entities (including band councils, tribal councils and self-government entities), and
- health and social services institutions.



Provincially/territorially funded public institutions are eligible to receive funding, with the agreement of the provincial/territorial government.

Projects must scale up services that have already shown positive results in Canada in helping seniors age in place, and must end by March 31, 2025, with funding between \$100,000 and \$2 million available per project
