#### FONOM joins with Police Departments and Association to discuss Catch and Release

Members of the Federation of Northern Ontario Municipalities (FONOM) Board met with the Sault Ste. Marie Police Services Board Chair, Sault Ste. Marie Police Service, Timmins Police Service, and the North Bay Police Association, to discuss the negative impacts Federal Bill C75 is having on communities across Ontario.

During a FONOM Board meeting in July 2022, Sault Ste. Marie's Police Chief Hugh Stevenson, shared the current catch-and-release procedures. At the meeting, FONOM membership committed to create a Northern Task Force to focus on the issue. The Task Force will consist of three FONOM board members, two municipal police chiefs, and an OPP service board member. The first meeting of the task force was held in Sault Ste Marie on Wednesday, February 16th, 2023. See below for a list of attendees.

"Citizens of Northern Ontario are angry. People that break into our homes and traumatize law-abiding citizens are arrested by police, then released the same day, some of them, committing another crime later that day," said FONOM President Danny Whalen. "The lack of movement to examine the legislation four years after implantation is unacceptable and we will continue to bring a northern voice to decision makers.

Moving forward, FONOM will work to increase participation from northern police services such as the Nishnawbe Aski Police Service, other northern Police Association representatives and government officials. The task force is communicating with the Attorney General's and Solicitor General's officers to participate in ongoing discussions around catch and release.

During the meeting Chief Stevenson, an Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police (OACP) Board Member, shared with the FONOM four recommended amendments for Bill C-75.

- 1. Create a designation of a chronic persistent offender,
- 2. Allow community impact statements at bail and at bail hearings,
- 3. Creating reverse onus in bail for all firearm offences, and
- Ensure bail-related firearm charges go to the superior court for bail hearing.

"Violent crime up 80% in last five years in our community," stated Sault Ste Marie Police Chief Hugh Stevenson, "cyclical issues continue to cost municipalities, in staffing and financial resources for EMS, Police, Fire, Court and Correction services for these violent incidents."

The next Taskforce meeting will be held in Timmins on April 12th, ahead of the OACP Zone 1A meeting. Chief Stevenson has agreed to participate in a panel discussion on Catch and Release during the May FONOM Conference in Parry Sound.

FONOM is an association of some 110 districts/municipalities/cities/towns in Northeastern Ontario mandated to work for the betterment of municipal government in Northern Ontario and strive for improved legislation respecting local government in the North. It is a membership-based association drawing members from Northeastern Ontario and is governed by an 11-member board.





Dear Mr. Calandra:

This is Resolution No. 2023-82 which was passed by Council at its Regular Meeting of Council held Tuesday, February 14, 2023.

#### Resolution No. 2023-82:

"Whereas the recently announced Construction Funding Subsidy (CFS) by the Ministry of Long Term Care could have significantly benefitted the member funding Municipalities of Cassellholme;

And Whereas that funding was intended to incent new construction and provide financial stability during the recent unexpected construction cost and financing cost increases,

And Whereas Cassellholme's borrowing rate at Infrastructure Ontario will not be fixed until construction completion and has increased in the past year by approximately 2% representing about a \$1,500,000.00 annual increase to the Municipalities;

And Whereas the Provincial Construction Funding Subsidy was increased in 2020 and has not since increased with rising construction costs and borrowing costs, significantly increasing the financial costs to the member Municipalities;

And Whereas on an expected mortgage payment of \$6,000,000.00 per year, about \$2,000,000.00 is presently financed by Provincial CFS funding, leaving about \$4,000,000.00 in capital levies from the municipalities,

And Whereas with the CFS top-up funding the same \$6M would be paid by about \$5,000,000.00 in Provincial funding and \$1,000,000.00 in levies.

Therefore Be it Resolved that this information be shared with the Ministry of Long Term Care and Treasury Board with a request that the application criteria for the CFS top-up of \$35 per bed-day be expanded to include Homes already under construction including Cassellholme.

And Further that a copy of this Motion be provided to Ministry of Long Term Care, Treasury Board, MPP Victor Fedeli, and Member Municipalities."

AMO Policy Update – Release of Plan for Connected and Convenient Care, Phase II Regulations for Fixing Long-Term Care Act, and Provincial Emergency Management Plan

#### Release of "Your Health: A Plan for Connected and Convenient Care"

The provincial government has released "Your Health: A Plan for Connected and Convenient Care", a plan to deliver connected and convenient health care. This plan sets out government initiatives under three pillars: The Right Care in the Right Place, Faster Access to Care, and Hiring More Health Care Workers.

The plan includes previous announcements regarding Ontario Health Teams, long-term care beds, and health human resources, among other health care initiatives. While there are no new announcements related to municipal health services, Your Health outlines how these measures fit into the province's overall health care plan.

### Release of Phase II Regulations for the *Fixing Long-Term Care Act, 2021*

High level descriptions of the proposed Phase II regulations for the *Fixing Long-Term Care Act, 2021* have been <u>released</u> and are open for comment until March 5, 2023. The provincial government is proposing that the regulations come into force on April 11, 2023. The proposed regulations cover staffing qualifications, medication management and drug administration, resident experience, and technical amendments.

The posting includes an analysis of regulatory impact that estimates that the proposed regulations will generate an estimated average direct compliance cost for licensees (with operational funding) of approximately \$15,900 in the first year of implementation and \$4,200 per year in subsequent years. The total estimated direct compliance costs for all licensees across the province is \$33.5 million over a ten-year period.

AMO continues to advocate to the province for full funding of all regulations related to the implementation of the *Fixing Long-Term Care Act, 2021*, and will work with AdvantAge Ontario to assess the accuracy of the projected cost impact.

#### Provincial Emergency Management Strategy and Action Plan


Following strong advocacy for better cooperation between municipal and provincial levels of government on emergency management, AMO was pleased to see the recent release of the <u>Provincial Emergency Management Strategy and Action Plan</u>. The plan seeks to ensure Ontarians are safe, practiced and prepared before, during and after emergencies and is the product of productive and ongoing engagement with the municipal sector.

This plan identifies three goals and concrete actions designed to keep Ontario in a state of constant readiness and preparedness—both now and into the future:

- One Window for All Ontarians which positions <u>Emergency</u> <u>Management Ontario</u> to proactively coordinate and facilitate across emergency management partners.
- **Proactive Planning and Monitoring** that is grounded in data, analytics and knowledge.

 Practiced and Prepared Emergency Response through strengthened local capabilities, emergency management training and public education.

## AMO Policy Update - Pre-Budget Submission and Call to Action on Housing and Homelessness

#### **AMO Pre-Budget Submission to Standing Committee**

AMO presented its <u>Pre-Budget Submission</u> to the Standing Committee on Finance and Economic Affairs today. The submission focused on increasing the supply of housing and tackling the homelessness crisis in Ontario brought on by decades of failed provincial social and economic policies. <u>A news release</u> with highlights was circulated immediately following the presentation.

Through the <u>remarks to the Committee</u>, AMO called on the government to work *with* the municipal sector on increasing housing supply, provide immediate clarity on the province's commitment to offset the cost impacts of Bill 23 on property taxpayers, and commit to reverse legislative measures that are creating unintended consequences.

AMO also highlighted homelessness across the province as a "made-in-Ontario" crisis created by the policy choices, underinvestment and indifference of successive provincial governments in areas such as income assistance, affordable housing, and mental health and addictions supports. AMO called for urgent, integrated and collaborative action.

#### **AMO Member Action on Housing and Homelessness**

Hearing from municipal Councils, elected officials and members of the public in your communities will be a critical part of calling on the provincial government for action. To

support this effort, AMO is encouraging municipal governments and District Social Service Administration Boards to:


- work through local and social media channels to support the messages in AMO's Pre-Budget Submission. - consider passing a <u>Council resolution</u> in advance of or close to the provincial budget, anticipated in late March; and

Re: 2023 Municipal Levy

Your 2023 Municipal Levy Information Package is attached. The 2023 cost-shared budget was prepared based on the 2022 provincially approved funding including provincial mitigation funding for 2023, with an increase of 1% in the levy. The allocation between municipalities has been adjusted based on the 2022 Municipal Property Assessment Corporation population numbers, so individual municipalities may have increases or decreases based on how their population changed relative to the other municipalities.

The mitigation funding from the province is intended to cover the additional municipal cost due to the change in the cost-sharing formula to 30% municipal / 70% provincial and some previously 100% provincial funded programs which became cost-shared. This change would have resulted in a 42% increase in the levy. The Province provided this transition funding to eliminate the 2022 increase for municipalities. It also covers the reduction to the base funding of \$369,710 that was also introduced at that time.

There is no indication at this time that there will be further transitional funding in 2024, so it would be prudent for municipalities to plan for an approximate 50% increase in 2024 on a similar shareable base of \$17,160,804.

The years 2020 and 2022 were extraordinary ones for public health, and uncertainty persists in 2023, as the fight against COVID-19 continues. Understandably, the pandemic has interrupted discussions with the Province about public health system changes, so no new information is available on this topic.

It is more important than ever for the Health Unit to stay focused on our mission, "to foster healthy living within our communities by preventing illness, promoting healthy choices, and providing trusted support and information". This year's budget allows this important work to continue at the current level. In 2022, the Health Unit received approximately \$3.11 million in COVID-19 funding by the province. In 2023, a request will be made for similar 100% provincial funding to cover the costs of COVID-19 that cannot be funded through cost-shared mandatory funding.
